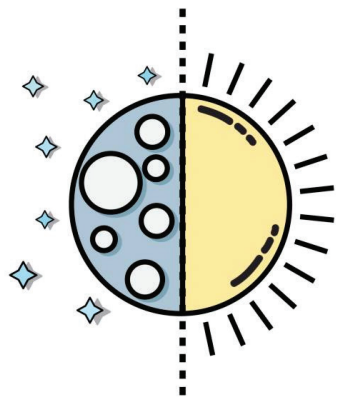

(For ages 9-12)

(Young adult fiction)
